

Call for Papers

Offered papers

Offered papers will be presented at the Congress as posters. A maximum of two abstracts per participant will be accepted.

Instructions for poster presenters

- Poster papers have equal status as of invited oral presentations. Abstracts of papers will be printed and available to all delegates at the Congress.
- A display panel will be allocated to each poster. Posters will be A0 paper size (840 mm by 1,188 mm, portrait format only). The organiser will supply dual scotch tape to attach the posters to the panel. No pens, pins or writing materials may be used on the display panels.
- Posters must be legible from a distance of at least 2 metres. Headings and subtitles should have the smallest letters in 80-point font (lowercase 12 mm, capitals 17 mm) in the text the smaller letters should be at least 36-point font (lowercase 7 mm, capitals 9 mm) with a line thickness of 1 mm.
- Each poster will have a single, easy to follow message, be readable in a few minutes, eye-catching, have logical layout, and include a photograph of the presenting authors for identification, along with authors' names and addresses. Use colour pictures, graphs and diagrams in preference to tables.
- Avoid excessive details and keep the number of words to a minimum. Use only key phrases or points. Authors will be beside posters for detailed discussion at certain times.

Abstract layout (see example)

Titles must be

- bold and in 9 point Arial;
- preferably less than 100 characters long (including

spaces and punctuation);

- must fit in no more than 2 lines;
- in lower case except for:
 - the first letter;
 - the first letter of:
 - proper names,
 - names of genera,
 - higher taxonomic grouping.
- scientific names of genera and species should be in italics;
- the rest of the abstracts should be in Times New Roman 10 point.

Authors

- must be listed in upper and lower case, with initials before the surname and in italics;
- each initial must be followed by a full stop, but with no space between initials;
- insert a space between the full stop of the final initial and the surname;
- underline the name of the presenting author;
- authors' names separated with a comma, except for the last two names in the list, which are separated by "and".

Address of presenting author

- in italics, with sufficient information to enable readers to contact him/her, but no more;
- start on a separate line, and avoid breaking lines within the address.

The e-mail address of the presenting author should be included.

The body of the abstract:

- not exceed 250 words;
- not include subheadings, tables or figures or references;
- be written as one paragraph.

Spelling and grammar should follow standard British English usage.

Title, author list, addresses and the body of the abstract to be **fully justified**.

The Scientific Secretariat reserves the right to edit abstracts for spelling, grammar, punctuation and clarity, and to shorten abstracts exceeding the 250-word limit.

Abstract Example

Strategies for biological control of sclerotial pathogens

Control of sclerotial pathogens can be achieved using a range of biological control strategies. *Coniothyrium minitans* A69 gave effective control of the soil-borne pathogen *Sclerotinia sclerotiorum* on bean and brassica crops when incorporated into the soil 6 weeks before planting. In contrast, control of *S. minor* on lettuce was achieved by incorporating A69 in the transplant potting mix. Sclerotial parasitism was shown to be the main mechanism of biocontrol operating against *S. sclerotiorum* whilst localized antibiosis was the underlying mechanism operating against *S. minor*. Although A69 was able to parasitize sclerotia of the onion pathogen *Sclerotium cepivorum*, this strategy was considered impractical for control of the disease in commercial cropping because of the small size of the sclerotia and their extensive distribution throughout the soil profile. An alternative strategy, based upon application of *Trichoderma atroviride* C52 pellets to the planting furrow, provided 75% disease control. C52 was shown to colonize the root region and suppress pathogen growth via nutrient competition and localised antibiosis. Sclerotial parasites effective against *Sclerotinia* and *Sclerotium* species were not effective against sclerotia of *Ciborinia camelliae*, the causal agent of camellia blight. Research identified a modified strategy for control of this pathogen. Bark mulches amended with white rot fungi, applied to the base of camellia, brought about rapid decay of sclerotia and a significant reduction in disease. In conclusion, although each pathogen produces sclerotia as an important component of its life cycle, different biocontrol strategies were needed to provide effective control of each disease.

1 - FORESTRY AND FOREST PATHOLOGY - AOSTA VALLEY

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

Full day tour/ max. 50 persons cost € 58.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide and lunch included)

A one day tour to include Col San Carlo - Tête d'Arpy, Arpy and Morgex. The excursion will be in naturally regenerated forests of the Aosta Valley, in the western Italian Alps. Diseases of conifers, including scotch pine and Norway spruce, growing in pure and mixed stands, are among the most important topics of the excursion. The technical visit will also deal with small-scale forestry and forest management in Alpine conditions, including demonstrations of forest harvesting and control of Heterobasidion butt rots.

2 - HORTICULTURE - SALUZZO (CUNEO)

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

Full day tour/ max. 50 persons cost € 73.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide, admission ticket and lunch included)

Fruit growing: kiwi fruit, apple, and peach in the land of the Marquisate of Saluzzo.

Saluzzo is located in North-Western Italy at the foot of Mount Monviso in a rich fruit growing area. The technical visit will offer the possibility to see different systems for kiwi fruit, apple and peach production, dealing with the main phytopathological problems found in orchards and during storage.

3 - ORGANIC AGRICULTURE, ALPINE BOTANICAL GARDEN AND THE ART OF CUISINE - PELLICE VALLEY

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

Full day tour/ max. 50 persons cost € 60.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide, admission ticket and lunch included)

Val Pellice is a beautiful valley that mixes culture, tradition and gracious landscapes, in the western Italian Prealps.

This excursion will be a mix of trekking experience and visit to organic agriculture research facilities. It will be possible to visit some organic farms and the related diseases and the alpine botanical garden at 2,000 meters. Suggested for people that can walk for 3 hours without problems. Trekking equipment required.

4 - ORNAMENTALS - LAKE MAGGIORE

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

Full day tour/ max. 50 persons cost € 62.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide, admission ticket and lunch included)

This visit will include one of the most interesting areas of Piedmont for the cultivation of ornamental species and for the landscape around the shore of the lake. The excursion will begin visiting an important nursery for cutting





production of acidophilous plants including azaleas, rhododendron and camellias, used also in the flower compositions during the 2006 Olympic winter games. In the afternoon a visit to the botanical gardens of villa Taranto will take place.

5 - SLOW FOOD - POLLENZO (CUNEO)

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

Full day tour/ max. 50 persons cost € 64.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide, admission ticket and lunch included)

The excursion will include the visit to the head office of Slow Food, an international non-profit association that promotes food and wine culture while also protecting food and agricultural biodiversity worldwide. The excursion will begin visiting the Slow Food association, with a special focus on its history, projects and activities for the promotion of a “taste education” and sustainable agriculture. In the afternoon the excursion will end with the visit of the “University of Gastronomic Sciences”, the world’s first Academy of “eno-gastronomy”, and the “Wine Bank”, a beautiful wine cellar with over 200 different Italian wines.

6 - VITICULTURE AND GRAPEVINE PATHOLOGY- ALBA, LANGHE and ROERO

(Saturday, August 30, 2008)

full day tour/ min. 50 persons, cost € 61.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, guide, admission ticket and lunch included)

The area of Langhe and Roero is located in North-Western Italy and is one of the most important wine growing areas in Italy. The technical visit will offer the possibility to see the most important Piedmontese vine cultivars near the grape harvest, dealing with the main phytopathological problems found in vineyards and their consequences in wine making.

7 - GRAPEVINE/HORTICULTURE - VENETO

(Saturday and Sunday, August 30 - 31, 2008)

The Bardolino wine region is located along the hilly Eastern shore of Lake Garda, around the lakeside town of Bardolino. Many of its hillside vineyards are exposed to the extra sunshine reflected off the lake. The main objective for this tour will be to gain knowledge of an



important area for viticulture and horticulture in Western Veneto. During the tour it will be possible to visit vineyards and orchards.

8 - FRUIT GROWING: PEACH AND PEAR - EMILIA ROMAGNA

(August 30 - 31, 2008)

Two days tour/ min. 50 persons, cost € 290.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, hotel, guide, admission ticket and three meals included)

Romagna is located in the eastern part of the Po Valley (Northern Italy), close to the Adriatic sea. The Po Valley is the most important area for the cultivation of industrial and horticultural crops in Italy. Participants will have the opportunity to see different orchard management systems for peach and pear production and the main diseases affecting such crops. The tour includes also a visit to packing houses with facilities for the post-harvest treatment and handling of fruit.

9 - VEGETABLE AND FLOWER CROPS - LIGURIA

(August 30 - 31, 2008)

Two days tour/ min. 50 persons, cost € 300.00 (V.A.T. 20% included) per person (bus, hotel, guide, admission ticket and three meals included)

The excursion will be along the Riviera Ligure in the Albenga and Sanremo areas, in the Western Italian coast. The main topics of the excursion will be vegetable and ornamental crop diseases. These crops are grown both in open fields and in glasshouses. In addition the excursion will offer participants an overview on several minor crops including leafy vegetables and aromatic plants grown under Mediterranean climate conditions.



General Information

INTRODUCTION TO TORINO - Capital of Western Alps and Piedmont Region, Torino was founded 2,300 years ago by a celtic tribe, and was a Roman military camp called “Augusta Taurinorum” in the early Roman period. Taurus is latin for bull and still today the bull is the symbol of Torino. In the Middle Ages the Savoys, Lords from the homonymous French region, began to extend their ambitions towards the most important territories in Piedmont. Since the 17th century, it has been the seat of the Savoy Dynasty. In the 19th century, Torino was the first capital of the Italian Kingdom after the unification of Italy. Nowadays Torino is a modern industrial and commercial city, the seat of Fiat and many other industries as well as the home of the famous Martini, Cinzano and Carpano Vermouth Industries. Torino also boasts artistic churches, buildings and well-known museums. The most important of these is the Egyptian Museum, the second largest in the world after the one in Cairo. The large squares, the straight avenues lined with trees and the streets with arcades give the city an appearance of noble and charming elegance. Besides being famous for their wide selection of typical regional food and wines like Barolo, Barbaresco and Dolcetto, Piedmont and Torino are well-known also for their hors-d'oeuvres and “pasticceria” (small pastries, friandises, chocolate). Some of the old caffè bars (Baratti & Milano, Al Bicerin, Caffè Fiorio, Caffè Torino, Caffè San Carlo, Caffè Pepino, Caffè Mulassano) once visited by aristocracy, are open to the public and one can still enjoy some of the old recipes and live the atmosphere of the past centuries. 
